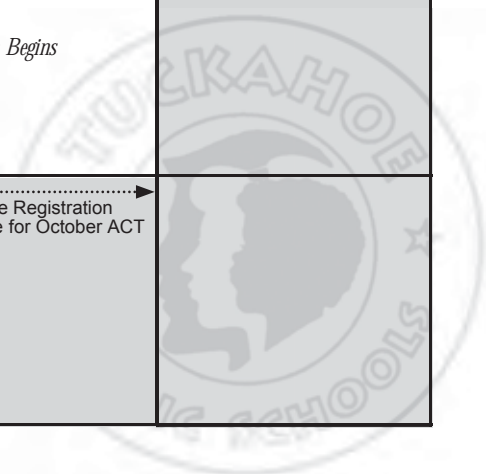

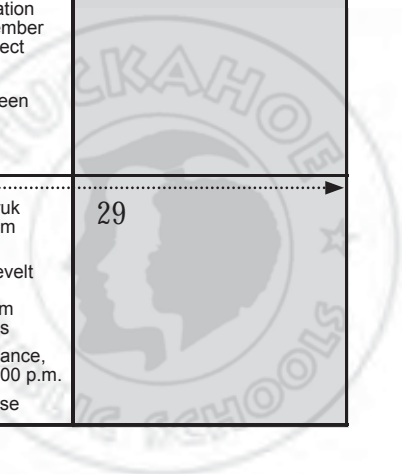

Tuckahoe High School Senior Helena Honkanleми was named a “Commended Student” In the 2011 National Merit Scholarship Program in recognition of her high performance and outstanding academic potential.

Maria Kyriakakos was among the highest scoring participants in New York State in the Johns Hopkins University International Mathematics and Verbal Talent Search.

Sarah Marie Lewis has been selected to receive the Lanza Family Foundation Award of \$5,000.

Three of our 10th grade students were chosen to receive partial scholarships to the prestigious international program called the Experiment for International Living. They spent the summer abroad with a host family and immersed themselves in the culture of the region. Thomas Conboy traveled to Korea, Samantha Romano to Chile and Alessandra Cirillo to Germany.

Tuckahoe High School students participated in the poetry and art contest sponsored through the 20th Annual Community Interfaith Holocaust and Human Rights commemoration. Our students won first place prizes in all areas. The competition was between Tuckahoe, Bronxville and Eastchester students.

The Diop-Dia sisters, Theresse and Anna competed in the Westchester-region NAACP’s annual ACT-SO competition at White Plains High School, and the dynamic duo were awarded Gold medals.

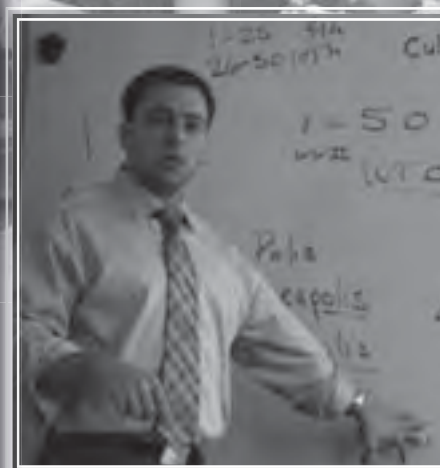
The Regional Middle School Science Olympiad Competition was held at Scarsdale Middle School. TMS was a force to be reckoned with having competed against 25 schools in 20 events bringing home 3 gold medals, a silver medal, a bronze medal, and one 6th place medal.

Parandis Nejati participated in the Westchester Science Fair. The fair contained more than 270 projects and Parandis received an award from the Westchester Academy of Medicine for her work.

On March 29, 2011 a group of seventh graders at Tuckahoe Middle School served as an enraptured audience to Julia Kaufman, Ph.D. of the Rockefeller Institute, whose work in cellular research is in the vanguard of scientific investigation into groundbreaking treatments for many types of cancer.

The PTA Health and Nutrition Committee taught Cottle students about the healthful benefits of plants to the earth and of the civic responsibility for keeping their school beautiful.

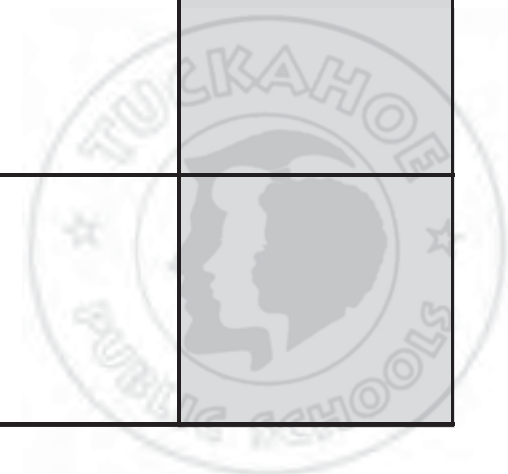

Helping Parents Resolve Problems At School

As hard as parents, teachers, and students work to try to make each school day productive and successful, the reality is that from time to time problems arise. It is important to resolve all problems as quickly and completely as possible.

If your teachers and administrators do not know about a problem, they cannot help you solve it. To help students have the best possible school experience, we ask all parents to follow these simple guidelines when a problem occurs:

- When your child has a problem or concern, call the teacher who is most directly involved.
- If you are not satisfied with the solution after your discussion with the teacher, call the school principal. The principal will review the situation and make recommendations for a resolution.
- If the problem is not resolved to your satisfaction after your discussion with the principal, call the superintendent. He will study the issue and develop a plan for resolving the problem.
- If you are still not satisfied with the resolution, write a letter about your concern to the Board of Education for their consideration.

HELPFUL HINTS IN HANDLING PROBLEMS

The following information was excerpted from the National Association of Elementary School Principals' brochure.

Why is it important to begin with my child's teacher?

Your child's teacher is likely to have the most information about the problem. Starting with the teacher also demonstrates your respect.

When a problem comes up, how should I deal with the school?
Teachers and administrators understand that some of their

actions may be met with initial responses of anger and frustration by parents, but parents must keep in mind that such responses lead to confrontation rather than problem-solving. Try to keep an open mind, get the facts, and write them down. You will then be in a better position to clearly discuss what you see as the issues to be resolved.

When I want to report a problem, should I use my name?

Parents often express concern that their child will suffer retribution at school if his or her name is associated with a complaint. On the contrary, teachers and administrators appreciate it when you present your concerns in a way that shows you are willing to solve problems and they can assure you that retribution is not tolerated. Giving your name lends credibility to your complaint and allows for follow-up to ensure that the complaint has been investigated and resolved.

Who should I believe when told about an incident that happened at school?

Often the conflict and emotions that arise from an incident cloud the retelling. You should look for the facts and suspend judgment until you have heard and thought about all sides of the story.

What's the best way to contact a teacher about a problem?

Let the teacher know by phone or in person that you have a problem you wish to discuss. It's a good idea to have prepared notes, including questions to be asked, clarifications to be sought, and points to be made. Listen without interruption to the teacher's response, while taking additional notes. If you are dissatisfied with the outcome of the discussion, tell the teacher that you plan to bring the matter to the next level. Whether you do this or not, it's important to avoid confrontation and maintain civil contact with the teacher about your child's education in general.

What are the best strategies for contacting the principal about a problem?

Call or make an appointment to see the principal. Tell him or her that you have spoken with the teacher. Use your notes to describe the outcome. If you bypassed the teacher, explain why and share whatever information you have.

In either case, understand that the principal will not address your problem until he or she has spoken with the teacher – who may be invited to sit in on the discussion – and examined all available resources.

How do I develop a good relationship with my child's teacher?

Call or introduce yourself personally to teachers early in the school year. Share information about your child and your family, including interests and activities. Building relationships with teachers early may help prevent problems later.

THE FACTS ABOUT NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT OF 2001

The No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) was passed in 2001 and is President George Bush's education reform law. For more information on NCLB, go to www.ed.gov. This information is from the Web site. Here are some key facts and terms that you should know about how this law helps your child:

■ **Flexibility:** No Child Left Behind gives states and school districts more control and more flexibility to use resources where they are needed most. Principals and administrators will spend less time filling out forms and more time helping your child learn.

■ **Accountability:** No Child Left Behind holds schools accountable for results.

■ **School Report Cards:** No Child Left Behind gives parents report cards so they can see which schools are succeeding and why. With this information, No Child Left Behind gives parents, community leaders, teachers, principals, and elected leaders the information they need to improve schools.

■ **Public School Choice:** No Child Left Behind may let you transfer your child to another public school if the state says that your child's school is in need of improvement. In most cases, your school district will pay for transportation for your child. Contact your child's school district to find out if your child has this opportunity.

■ **Extra Help with Learning:** No Child Left Behind may also provide your child with free tutoring and extra help with schoolwork if the state says your child's school has been in need of improvement for at least 2 years. This extra help is often referred to as Supplemental Educational Services. Contact your child's school district to find out if your child qualifies.

■ **Parental Involvement:** No Child Left Behind requires schools to develop ways to get parents more involved in their child's education and in improving the school. Contact your child's school to find out how you can get involved.

■ **Measuring Knowledge:** No Child Left Behind requires states to test your child in reading and math every year in grades 3-8. Your child will also be tested at least once in high school. The tests will help you, your child, and your child's teachers know how well your child is learning and when he or she needs extra help.

■ **Scientifically Based Research:** No Child Left Behind focuses on teaching methods that have been proven by research to work. There will be no more experimenting on children with educational fads.

■ **Reading First:** No Child Left Behind provides more than one billion dollars a year to help children learn to read. Reading First is the part of No Child Left Behind that is dedicated to ensuring all children learn to read on grade level by the third grade. Reading First provides money to states and many school districts to support high quality reading programs based on the best scientific research. Contact your child's school district to find out if its reading program is based on research.

■ **Teacher Quality:** No Child Left Behind provides funding to help teachers learn to be better teachers every year in grades 3-8 and at least once in high school.

Terms Every Parent Needs To Know

TERMS EVERY PARENT NEEDS TO KNOW

- **Title I** - This is the part of No Child Left Behind that supports programs in schools and school districts to improve the learning of children from low-income families. The U.S. Department of Education provides Title I funds to states to give to school districts based on the number of low-income families in the districts.
- **State Assessments** - This refers to the tests developed by your state that your child will take every year in grades 3-8 and at least once in high school. Using these tests, the state will be able to compare schools to each other and know which ones need extra help to improve. Contact your child's school or school district to find out more details about your state's tests.
- **Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)** - This is the term No Child Left Behind uses to explain that your child's school has met state reading and math goals. Your child's school's report card will let you know whether or not the school has made AYP.
- **School in Need of Improvement** - This is the term No Child Left Behind uses to refer to schools receiving Title I funds that have not met state reading and math goals (AYP) for at least two years. If your child's school is labeled a "school in need of improvement," it receives extra help to improve and your child has the option to transfer to another public school, including a public charter school. Also, your child may be eligible to receive free tutoring and extra help with schoolwork. Contact your child's school district to find out if your child qualifies.
- **Supplemental Educational Services (SES)** - This is the term No Child Left Behind uses to refer to the tutoring and extra help with schoolwork in subjects such as reading and math that children from low-income families may be eligible to receive. This help is provided free of charge and generally takes place outside the regular school day, such as after school or during the summer.
- **Highly Qualified Teacher (HQT)** - This is the term No Child Left Behind uses for a teacher who proves that he or she knows the subjects he or she is teaching. It also means that the teacher has a college degree and is state-certified. No Child Left Behind says that your child has the right to be taught by a Highly Qualified Teacher.

New York State Standards: Kindergarten To Twelfth Grade

The New York State Department of Education is phasing in new standards, state tests, and graduation requirements in all New York State schools. The new standards are consistent with the current direction of the Tuckahoe Schools' goals. Teachers have been revising, updating, and writing new curricula to support the standards. In addition, staff and parent meetings have been devoted to both the new standards and new tests. Academic support programs also have been developed to help prepare at-risk students to meet the new graduation requirements. The new state standards are:

The Arts

- Be knowledgeable about and make use of the materials and resources available in the arts.
- Respond critically to a variety of works in the arts, connecting the individual work to other works and to other aspects of human endeavor and thought.
- Develop an understanding of the personal cultural forces that shape artistic communication and how the arts, in turn, shape various cultures.

Career Development and Occupational Studies

- Be knowledgeable about the world of work, explore career options, and relate personal skills, aptitudes, and abilities to future career decisions.
- Demonstrate how academic knowledge and skills are applied in the workplace and other settings.
- Demonstrate mastery of the skills and competencies essential for success in the workplace. Choose a career major and acquire career-specific technical knowledge and skills needed to progress toward gainful employment, career advancement, and success in post-secondary programs.

English Language Arts

- Read, write, listen, and speak for information and understanding.
- Read, write, listen, and speak for literary response and evaluation.
- Read, write, listen, and speak for critical analysis and evaluation.
- Read, write, listen, and speak for social interaction.

Health, Physical Education, and Home Economics

- Have the necessary knowledge and skills to establish and maintain physical fitness, participate in physical activity, and maintain personal health.
- Acquire the knowledge and ability to create and maintain a safe and healthy environment.
- Understand and be able to manage personal and community resources.

Languages Other Than English

- Be able to use a language other than English for communication.
- Develop cross-cultural skills and understanding.

Mathematics, Science and Technology

- Use mathematical analysis, scientific inquiry, and engineering

design, as appropriate, to pose questions, seek answers, and develop solutions.

- Access, generate, process, and transfer information using appropriate technologies.
- Understand mathematics and become mathematically confident by communicating and reasoning mathematically, by applying math in real-world settings, and by solving problems through the integrated study of number systems, geometry, algebra, data analysis, probability, and trigonometry.
- Understand and apply scientific concepts, principles, and theories pertaining to the physical setting and living environment and recognize the historical development of ideas in science.
- Apply technological knowledge and skills to design, construct, use, and evaluate products and systems to satisfy human environmental needs.
- Understand the relationships and common themes that connect mathematics, science, and technology and apply the themes to these and other areas of learning.
- Apply the knowledge and thinking skills of mathematics, science, and technology to address real-life problems and make informed decisions.

Social Studies

- Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate understanding of major ideas, eras, themes, developments, and turning points in the history of the United States and New York State.
- Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate understanding of major ideas, themes, developments, and turning points in world history and examine the broad sweep of history from a variety of perspectives.
- Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate understanding of the geography of the interdependent world in which we live – local, national and global – including the distribution of people, places, and environments over the earth's surface.
- Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate understanding of how the United States and other societies develop economic systems and associated institutions to allocate scarce resources, how major decision-making units function in the United States and other national economies, and how an economy solves the scarcity problem through market and non-market mechanisms.
- Use a variety of intellectual skills to demonstrate understanding of the necessity for establishing governments, the governmental system of the United States and other nations, the United States Constitution, the basic civic values of American constitutional democracy, and the roles, rights, and responsibilities of citizenship, including avenues of participation.

For Your Information

ABSENCES

When a student returns to school after an absence, he/she must bring a note to the school nurse stating the reason for the absence. If the nurse does not receive a note, the student's record will reflect an illegal absence.

CLOSING OF SCHOOLS DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER

For emergency notifications and other school related matters, please sign up for our K-12 alerts emergency notification system. Please log on to our web site: www.TuckahoeSchools.org, click on the PARENTS tab, then K-12 ALERTS on the submenu to register for e-mail and text to cell alerts, 24/7.

Delayed openings or the closing of schools due to inclement weather or other emergencies will be broadcast over local TV stations WABC-TV (Channel 7) and FOX 5 TV (Channel 5); cable stations: NEWS 12 Westchester and Tuckahoe School Cable Access Channel 77. Also, the information will be broadcast over radio stations: WOR (710 AM) and WFAS (1230 AM, 103.9 FM), starting at 6 a.m. or as soon as the decision is made.

When schools are closed in Tuckahoe, district students will not be transported to private, parochial, or BOCES schools. However, in the event of delayed openings, all district buses will start their pick-ups

according to the revised schedule. Transportation will be provided in the case of emergency dismissal for any reason. Students will be dismissed in a manner that ensures their safe arrival at home. It is essential that parents provide the district with the name and telephone number of a person who will receive the student in the event the parent is not at home.

STANDARDS FOR LEARNING

The district continues to revise its curriculum standards to meet the challenges of the New York State Curriculum Frameworks. Site-based committees at each school building have developed action plans for school improvement, and, as a result, the district has developed a strategic plan under the accreditation process of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The site-based committees, known as Compact for Learning Teams, are made up of community members, parents, faculty, and administrators.

REGISTRATION

Registration of new students entering the Tuckahoe Schools is by appointment from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. during the last week in August at the district office, 65 Siwanoy Boulevard, Eastchester, NY. Please call 337-6600, Ext. 1262 to set up an appointment. Students who enter the district during the school year may register upon request.

Parent or guardian must bring originals: (1) a birth certificate, (2) the child's most recent report card, (3) an immunization record, (4) original deed, property tax bill or notarized lease, and (5) Con Edison, water or cable bill. New York State requires that all students be immunized against polio, measles, rubella (German measles), mumps, and diphtheria. Students will be excluded from school until proof of these immunizations is provided.

Kindergarten registration is in the spring of the previous school year as well as during the last week in August. Children who are five, or will be five by December 1st of the school year, are eligible to enter kindergarten in September.

SEARCH FOR PRESCHOOL CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL EDUCATION NEEDS

The Tuckahoe Schools, in compliance with federal law, maintain a census of all children with special

needs in the district. The district is especially interested in locating preschool children who may require planning for special education services.

The parent or the guardian of a child who is likely to require special educational planning should contact the Office of Special Education at 914-337-6600, ext. 1255

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

The Tuckahoe School District is dedicated to educating all special education students in the least restrictive environment. If appropriate programming is not available within the school district, a BOCES special class or placement within another public school district or private school will be explored. Each special education child, ages 3 through 21, has the right to a free, appropriate education. Requests for special education evaluation can be made to the Committee on Special Education by school personnel, parents, students 18 years or older, or outside agencies. Parents are continuously involved in the evaluation and placement process, and students are placed in special education by the due process procedures required by state and federal regulations.

TUCKAHOE AFTER SCHOOL CARE

Tuckahoe After School Care, Inc. (TASC) is a fully licensed before- and after-school program that provides appropriate and affordable supervision for students in grades K-7. The goal of TASC is to create a safe and nurturing environment through educational, social, and recreational activities, within an atmosphere that fosters success for all. Among other activities, TASC children participate in arts and crafts, athletics, computer, games, and reading. Past special events have included a talent show, a multi-cultural dinner, and musical programs presented through the Eastchester Arts Council. A separate homework room, supervised by TASC staff, is available. There is also an expanded day program on certain days when the schools are closed for whole or half-day sessions. TASC is administered and coordinated at the site by a program director and staff members. A Board of Directors, comprised of parent and teacher volunteers, is responsible for the budget and personnel as well as the setting of policies. Residents of Tuckahoe who wish transportation for school age children to private or parochial schools for 2012-2013 must submit their request in writing by April 1, 2012. Application forms will be available beginning January 1, 2012 on the District's website and at the Business Office. Applications must be renewed annually.

New residents moving into the district after April 1, 2012, must apply within 30 days after establishing residence in the district.

TUITION PROGRAM FOR NON-RESIDENTS

The Tuckahoe Schools have a program that admits qualified non-resident pupils on a tuition basis. This program is open to grade levels kindergarten through twelfth grade, where classroom space is available. Information regarding the application procedure, academic standards, and tuition is available at the superintendent's office.

TUCKAHOE SOCCER PARENTS ASSOCIATION

The Tuckahoe Parents Soccer Association was formed in September 2001 to recognize the students for their commitment to the sport and their teams. The organization works to raise money to further develop the soccer programs in the Tuckahoe Middle School and the Tuckahoe High School. School Budget Vote, Voter Registration, and Tax Exemptions

THE BUDGET PROCESS

The development of the school budget begins in the fall with the formulation of goals and objectives by the Board of Education. These goals provide parameters for the instructional staff that determine classroom needs for the following year. The superintendent consolidates their requests, making careful judgment about whether they support the goals of the district and are fiscally responsible. The superintendent also seeks input from parents and members of the community.

By February, the superintendent will present a draft budget to the Board of Education. At public study sessions, the Board of Education shapes a final spending plan which will ensure a high quality educational program for Tuckahoe students while recognizing the financial needs of the taxpayer. The final budget is submitted to the community for its approval in May.

Community residents are urged to attend budget study sessions and share their ideas and concerns with the Board of Education and the administration. Information about the proposed budget is distributed through mailings to the residents.

Board of Education elections take place at the same time as the budget vote. Candidates seeking election must file petitions 30 days prior to the vote.

The district strives to provide residents with budget information both in draft and final form:

- All budget meetings will be televised on Cable TV Channel 77.
- Videotaped copies of the budget meetings will be made available to the public, upon request.
- Copies of the draft and final budget may be obtained from the superintendent's office, 65 Siwanoy Boulevard, Eastchester, NY.
- Information on the budget, budget meetings, and the adopted budget will be mailed to all residents.

VOTER REGISTRATION

To vote on the budget and in the school board election, you must be:

- A United States citizen
- A resident for 30 days or more
- At least 18 years old
- A registered voter with the County Board of Elections or the School District Board of Registrars

You are a registered voter if:

- You are on the Westchester County voters' list and have voted at least once during the last four years or

PESTICIDE NOTIFICATION LAW

To: All School District Parents, Guardians, and Staff

New York State Education Law, Section 409-H, requires all public and non public elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to you, regarding actual use or potential use of pesticides throughout the school year. In addition, the Tuckahoe Union Free School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation and any of its faculty or staff members who wish to receive a 48-hour prior written notification of specific pesticide applications which may occur in the school district. This is to advise you that, since June 2004, there have been no applications of pesticides in the school district.

The Tuckahoe Union Free School District utilizes an integrated pest management program (IPM). The very purpose of an IPM program is to restrict or eliminate entirely the use of pesticides in or around district facilities. The school district's IPM program includes the use of a contracted firm, expert in the field of integrated pest management. This firm conducts regular inspections of all district facilities and takes appropriate remedial measures to eliminate or reduce the presence of insects or other pests.

While the district does not anticipate any situation where there will be a need to provide notification of a pesticide application 48 hours in advance, if you would like to receive such notification if one were required, please send a postcard or brief letter to Interim Director of Finance, Dr. Bruce Watkins, 65 Siwanoy Boulevard, Eastchester, NY, 10707, requesting pesticide application notification. Please include your name and address.

In the unlikely event that an application of a regulated pesticide application is required, the district would not apply such chemicals unless the schools were to remain unoccupied for a continuous period of 72 hours following the application. In doing so, a 48-hour notification would not be required.
